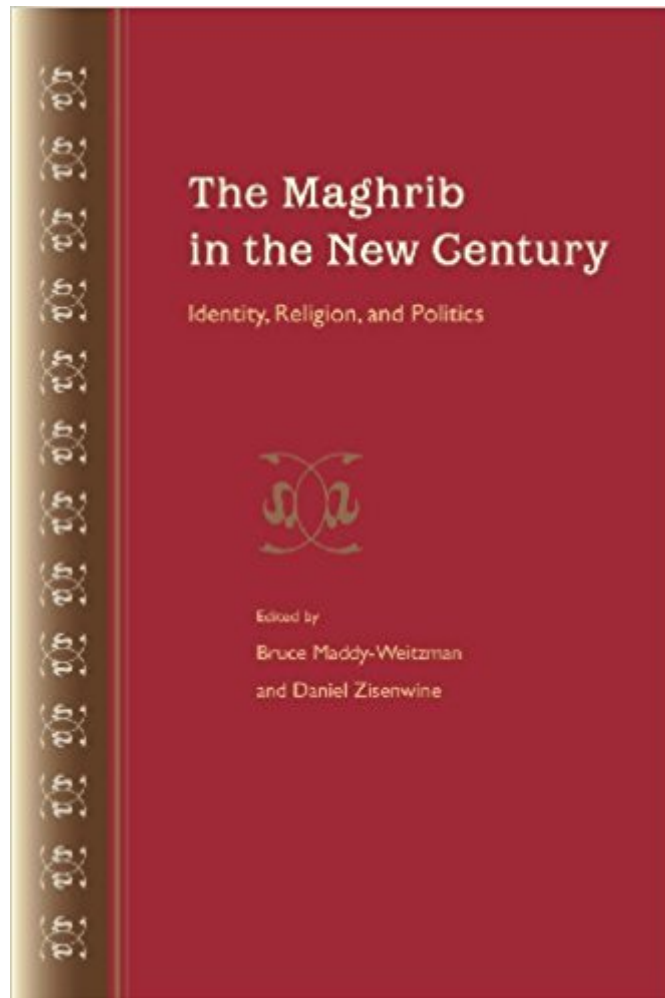




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The Maghrib In The New Century: Identity, Religion, And Politics
